Interns Assisting With Various Landscape Projects

So far it has been determined that a modification will need to be made to our plans for the proposed gateway sign on the corner of US-1 and Seminole Woods. Behind the sign destined for demolition there currently exists a massive magnolia tree which was evaluated to be in excellent health. This tree has now been incorporated into the proposed plan in lieu of the traditional planting of three palm trees behind our large signs. In order to better accommodate a tree which would add significant aesthetic value, an adjustment to the proposed sign placement as well as proposed grading around the sign was made. A fully mature magnolia tree can grow to an extravagant 100ft tall, and when in bloom produce showy white flowers which can be as wide as 12" in diameter.

Protection through Proactive Citizens

On April 27, 2016, Customer Service staff was notified by a concerned citizen that gopher tortoise have lived on an adjacent vacant lot for years. The citizen observed new marker stakes and was concerned the lot would be cleared. Customer Service forwarded this information to environmental staff for possible further action. After discussions with the concerned citizen, a site visit was warranted. The citizen noted that their family really enjoyed watching the different tortoises coming in and out of their yard. If fact, the family recently witnessed baby tortoises in the area. The family originally named the adult tortoise "Todd" but come to find out the individual was a female; one of the baby tortoises was named "Todd Jr.". With great concern, the citizen offered permission to staff to conduct a site visit via access of their property. A site inspection was conducted on May 16th, and an active burrow was confirmed on the lot in question. At this time, a permit application was not submitted for the property.

Since 2007, the City of Palm Coast has maintained a Gopher Tortoise Alert Database and explained to the citizen how staff tracks occurrences while identifying properties with a high potential of supporting gopher tortoise. With this and other tools, staff is equipped to proactively minimize threats to a burrow and associated individuals. Upon confirming the activity, staff "flagged" the referenced lot to trigger additional action upon the submittal of a permit application. Approximately a week later, a building permit application was submitted, and the applicant was unaware of the gopher tortoise activity. Environmental staff was notified of the application and was included on the permit review process. As noted in 10.04.04, Land Development Code, the City has the authority to require a gopher tortoise survey to ensure listed

species are protected. A gopher tortoise survey was conducted by Zev Cohen and Associates, Inc. (ZCA) biologists who took the time to coordinate with the neighboring concerned citizen on what to expect. City staff also provided routine updates to the citizen to assist with any concerns. After securing all the necessary approvals from Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, ZCA conducted a burrow investigation and relocation of a juvenile gopher tortoise to C. Herman Beville Ranch, a permitted gopher tortoise recipient site. The construction site has been secured by silt fencing to ensure additional individuals do not recruit back into the site. An after action report will be supplied as part of the building permit application resubmittal in order to release the hold on the project.





Through the care and concern of a thoughtful family, the gopher tortoise is now in safe and protected habitat. This event highlights one of many events of watchful citizens that help City staff with protecting our environment through innovative ways.

Re: Week in Review

In the past week, the department responded to 157 calls. There was one dumpster fire and one vehicle fire. There were 2 grass fires. A total of 98 EMS calls were logged and the balance was miscellaneous in nature. The drought index is at 484 out of a possible 800 and the fire danger is very high.

Renovations to Station 22 continue with good progress being made.

Station 23 had some water damage. The tile repairs to the women's restroom has been completed as of this week.

It has been a busy week. On Monday, within a 2-hour time frame, there was a dumpster fire, vehicle fire, brush fire, vehicle accident, along with medical calls.

We held a makeup class for Pediatric Advanced Life Support on Wednesday. We recertified 29 career personnel and 2 volunteers. We also held a CPR and First Aid Training Class this week.

Lobby security camera was installed at Fire Station 25.

Chief Beadle is on the Planning Team of Flagler County Collaborative Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP). It's been a year-long process to assess needs of the growing community and its health. CHIP has come up with a 3-year long range plan to address some of these health needs.

Deputy Chief Forte met with the Flagler Palm Coast High School and the County Fire Chief regarding the FPC Leadership Academy for the coming school year. The program is moving forward and anticipate the program class to kick off January 4th, 2017. Flagler School Board will meet to discuss the Memorandum of Understanding and answer questions. Flagler County Fire

Rescue will oversee the Lead Instructor and provide equipment and the municipalities will provide instructions to the joint educational effort.

Re: Week in Review

- As the dry weather continues, water demand continues to increase. The average water demand for the week was 9.649 million gallons per day; the average wastewater flow was 5.461
- Crews installed 12 new domestic water meters and 5 new pep tanks.
- There was a total of 26 calls after hours.
- This week there were 97 disconnects for non-payment.
- This week Admin replaced 20 year old carpet and base boards in two offices. The old carpet was worn, buckled and had become a trip hazard.
- Wastewater crews inspected via CCTV, 6,930 feet of gravity sewer and inspected 43 manholes. They also replaced 29 pep pumps, 34 floats, and 10 cleanout caps.
- Water distribution crews replaced 6 service lines (retrofit), repaired 14 service lines, and tested/repaired 163 backflow preventers.
- This week two employees attended backflow prevention testing and repair school.

Forest Grove Drive access onto Old Kings Road North to be eliminated Tuesday

Palm Coast – The City of Palm Coast will be closing the Forest Grove Drive access onto Old Kings Road North, near Matanzas High School, effective Tuesday morning, July 26. Motorists will no longer be able to access Old Kings Road North directly from Forest Grove.

This permanent road closure is the final step in the City's recent construction of the Palm Harbor Parkway extension, which was done as part of the new Interstate 95 interchange at Matanzas Woods Parkway. The new Old Kings Road extension was also part of the overall project. As part of the projects, traffic patterns around Matanzas High School have changed.

By closing the Forest Grove Drive access onto Old Kings Road North, Forest Grove will be turned back into a residential street as it was originally intended to be.

On Tuesday morning, Palm Coast Public Works crews will remove the existing asphalt within the City's right-of-way that previously served as a turn lane from Forest Grove onto Old Kings Road North adjacent to the high school. A fence with a gate that can be accessed only by emergency and school personnel will be installed Wednesday. Pedestrian access between Forest Grove and Old Kings Road North will be maintained via the existing sidewalk.

New signage, as well as temporary message boards, will be used to guide motorists. Motorists will be directed to get to Matanzas High School via the new signalized intersection at Matanzas Woods, Palm Harbor and Old Kings North. Motorists coming from the F Section who want to travel north on Old Kings Road North will be directed to use either the new Palm Harbor extension or the new Old Kings Road extension to get to Old Kings Road North.

City of Palm Coast's performance measurement system earns 'Certificate of Distinction'

Palm Coast – The International City/County Management Association (ICMA) has recognized the City of Palm Coast's performance management efforts with a Certificate of Distinction from the ICMA Center for Performance Analytics. This is the third straight year the City has received the award.

The City developed its performance measurement and reporting system in 2012 to align City services and programs with the City Council's Strategic Action Plan. The performance measures – used by all City departments – are tied to the City Council's six goals, which are: expansion, economic, finance, environmental, quality of life, and workforce talent. Progress (or lack thereof) is reported quarterly, and those reports are the basis for the City's Annual Progress Report.

"The certificate program recognizes communities that have demonstrated leadership in continuous improvement and community engagement using performance analysis," said ICMA Executive Director Robert J. O'Neill Jr. "Performance analysis is an integral component of professional local government management, and jurisdictions meeting the certificate qualifications serve as examples for other governments to follow."

ICMA assesses a local government's performance management program and encourages analysis of results by comparing to peers and gauging performance over time. Performance management aids in cost reduction, program prioritization, and quality improvement. It also encourages accountability and transparency.

Certificates are awarded at the levels of Achievement, Distinction, and the highest level, Excellence. Palm Coast is among eight jurisdictions receiving the Certificate of Distinction, and one of 52 recognized overall.

Criteria for the Certificate of Distinction include:

- Reporting of performance data to the public through budgets, newsletters, and/or information provided to elected officials
- Data verification efforts to ensure reliability
- Staff training
- Use of performance data in strategic planning and operational decision-making
- Sharing of performance measurement knowledge with other local governments through presentations, site visits, and other networking.

Palm Coast's performance management system allows City departments to measure results and make any needed adjustments to the results over the course of the year. The program was developed by a group of employees, through a team approach, and is used in coordination with the year-round budgeting process. Performance measures are updated annually.

"Our Strategic Action Plan process and performance management system have proven very successful in charting a course for continual improvement and for monitoring how we're doing to make sure Palm Coast remains a great place to live, work and play," said Palm Coast City Manager Jim Landon. "We use the process to guide City projects and initiatives identified by the Mayor and City Council during annual planning and budgeting."

"There are thousands of local governments, and this award from ICMA truly places us in the top tier of cities, so we are very honored," Landon said. "It's a real testament of the talent and dedication of our Council and employees."
