- The temporary use of free chlorine will continue through October 25th. During this time customers may notice an increase in the taste and odor of chlorine in their drinking water.
- The average water demand for the week was 7.636 million gallons per day.
- The average wastewater flow was 8.384 million gallons per day.
- There was a total of 127 calls after hours.
- Crews installed 7 new water meters, 8 new pep tanks and replaced 1 PEP tank.
- There are now 179 new meter installations pending with 16 that are cleared and ready for installation. There are 10 new PEP tanks pending and 21 existing tanks that need to be replaced.
- Replacement of PEP tanks that received damage from hurricane Irma began this week. Work is being done by Cline Construction and Gemstone Construction.
- On Wednesday at 9:00 am the 8" x 6" PVC tee fitting to a fire hydrant cracked on London Drive and was replaced with a mechanical joint Tee fitting and valve.
- Wastewater installed 4 new PEP assemblies and 10 electric assemblies, replaced 54 pep pumps, 27 floats and 15 cleanout caps, most of which were directly related to damage from hurricane Irma.
- Pump station maintenance crews have also been busy pulling and declogging pumps. This issue commonly arises when the system receives excess flow caused by flooding as was the case with hurricane Irma. The pipelines get "flushed" out, washing down foreign materials and debris into the pump stations.
- The Inflow/Infiltration crew also cleaned and inspected via CCTV, 800 feet of sewer main and inspected 3 manholes..
- On Tuesday, staff at Water Treatment Plant #3 replaced a failing motor on one of the interstage pumps.

## Hurricane Irma

Last week, Pike Electrical Contractors completed the repairs to the power lines that serve the 12 wells west of the Florida East Coast Railroad at Water Treatment Plant #3. All water supply wells now have full line power.

Pump Station IP-1 (Hargrove Grade) is still running on generator due to a downed power line and damage to the pump station control panel from hurricane Irma. This repair requires coordination between FPL and the City's electrical contractor.

MDA's spirited Fill the Boot campaign is an honored tradition in which thousands of dedicated fire fighters in hometowns across America hit the streets or storefronts asking pedestrians, motorists, customers and other passersby to make a donation to MDA, using their collective strength to help kids and adults live longer and grow stronger. Funds raised through 2017 Palm Coast Fill the Boot event empowers families with life-enhancing resources and support that open new possibilities and maximize independence so they can experience the world without any limits.

In addition to Fill the Boot drives, fire fighter contributions from year-round local events, including providing transportation for fundraising events, providing lunch for and visiting MDA Summer Camp as well as volunteering at the MDA Muscle help support MDA's efforts to raise awareness and provide professional and public education about neuromuscular diseases.

Contributions also help MDA's efforts to fund groundbreaking research and lifeenhancing programs such as state-of-the-art support groups and Care Centers, including the MDA Care Center at Mayo Clinic in Jacksonville and UF Health in Gainesville. #### A Car Seat Safety Check by Palm Coast Fire Department could save a life

**Palm Coast** – Road injuries are the leading cause of accidental deaths to children in the United States. Correctly used, child safety seats can reduce the risk of death by as much as 71 percent.

The Palm Coast Fire Department, in partnership with Safe Kids of Volusia/Flagler Counties, offers a free Car Seat Safety Check program – the only such program in Flagler County. Palm Coast Fire has offered this valuable community service for the past 10 years, both at fire stations and at special events. Car seat checks were conducted at Food Truck Tuesday earlier this month.

Palm Coast Fire has personnel who have been trained as car seat technicians who will check to make sure car seats are installed properly and to the manufacturer and vehicle specifications.

Residents should call the Fire Department at 386-986-2300 to schedule an appointment to have their Car Seat Safety Check done at one of the City's five fire stations. People are asked to bring their car seat manual and the vehicles owner's manual with them to the Car Seat Safety Check.

"There's so much to learn when you're a new parent. Keeping your child safe is the top priority, and the Palm Coast Fire Department would be pleased to help you make sure your baby's car seat is installed correctly," said Palm Coast Fire Capt. Kyle Berryhill. "It could make all the difference in preventing an injury or death in an accident."
