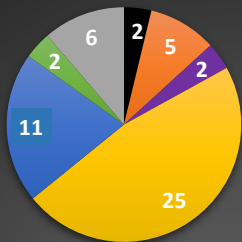

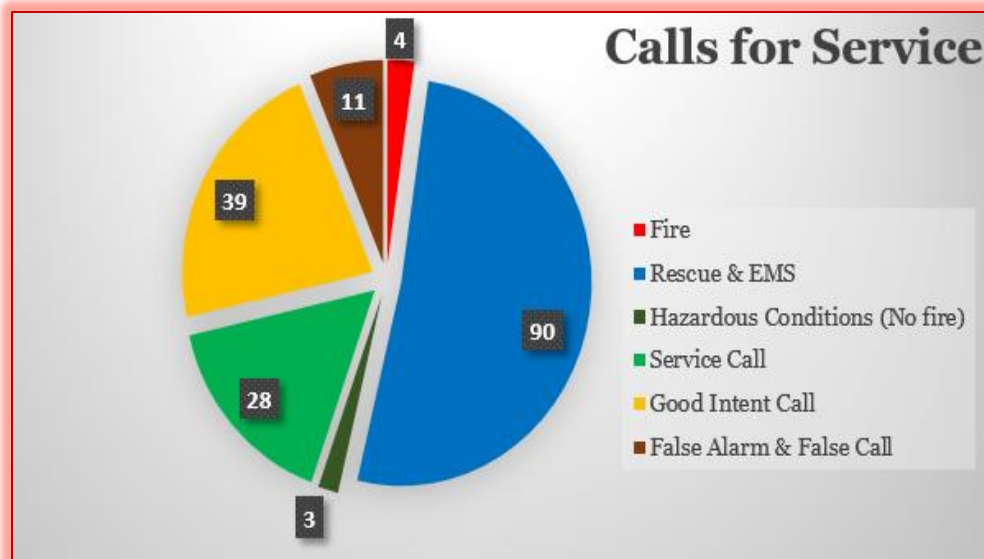

- The average water demand for the week was 7.178 million gallons per day.
- The average wastewater flow for the week was 10.805 million gallons per day. This flow is still about double the average for the plant, almost half being stormwater inflow.
- Wastewater collection staff continued working 12 hour shifts through Tuesday, still recovering after the major rain event performing daytime and nighttime tank trucking.
- Crews installed 19 new water meters, no new PEP tanks were installed this week.
- There are 189 new meter installations pending with 33 sites cleared and ready for install. At present time the department has 27 new pep tanks pending, 13 are site ready. There are also 47 PEP tank replacements pending. The high water table and the need to dewater before digging increases the time it takes to install new meters and PEP tanks and perform PEP tank replacements.
- The rain in the swales is also affecting other operations such as backflow testing, meter reading and meter replacements.
- Wastewater maintenance installed new motors in four Educator Stations damaged during storms.
- Removed asphalt, rebuilt the manhole chimney and installed new road base for manhole project on Waver Place.
- Replaced 47 PEP pumps, 39 floats and 15 cleanout caps.
- There were 57 calls after hours.



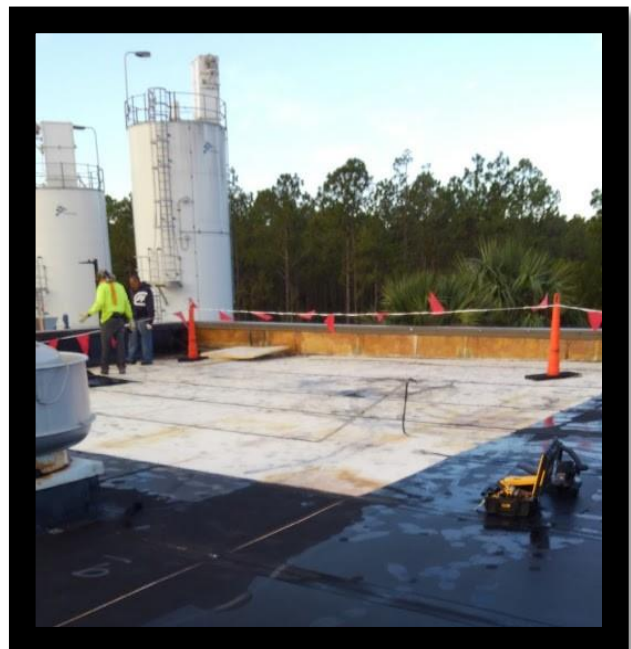

National Citizen Survey to be mailed to 1,500 Palm Coast residents

Palm Coast – The City of Palm Coast will soon be conducting a comprehensive citizen survey. Residents are asked to watch their mailboxes and, if selected to complete the survey, to please fill it out and return it as quickly as possible.

This year, 1,500 surveys for the National Citizen Survey (NCS) will be going out, and they are expected to arrive in mailboxes between Oct. 30 and Nov. 7. Residents are randomly selected to receive the survey, with representation from each of the City's four districts. The survey process is anonymous.

In addition to the mailed survey that goes to a sampling of residents, NCS also will be conducting an online version of the survey that will be open to all Palm Coast residents. The online survey will be conducted beginning in late November; details on how to take that online survey will be announced at a later time.

The City of Palm Coast has been participating in the NCS since 2002. Currently, the City conducts the NCS every other year, with the City conducting separate surveying on its own in the off years.

The City uses all survey results to improve city services. With the National Citizen Survey, Palm Coast's results are compared to more than 500 other local governments across the United States. The feedback received from residents is presented to the Palm Coast City Council and is used for strategic planning and to help City leaders set priorities for the next fiscal year.

Palm Coast Fire visited elementary and charter schools throughout the City of Palm Coast to teach students the importance of "Every Second Counts, Plan 2 Ways Out!" which is this year's National Fire Prevention Week theme. "Every Second Counts: Plan 2 Ways Out!" reinforces the need for everyone to have an escape plan and that in a fire, seconds count.

Fire Department personnel hosted small, interactive demonstrations at schools, churches and two area McDonald's restaurants to share fire prevention practices. Elementary school students had the opportunity to see a fire truck up close, watch firefighters demonstrate their gear and equipment, and practice how to stay low and crawl and Stop, Drop & Roll.

In November 2015, a Palm Coast Fire Department fire safety demonstration was credited for saving a life. A 7-year-old student at the Imagine School used what he had just recently learned to help him and his brother escape from a residential fire in western Flagler County.

"This is a fun way to interact with the kids, and most importantly, to share information that saves lives," said Palm Coast Fire Lt. Joey Paci, who was one of the familiar faces of the Palm Coast Fire Prevention Week at area schools.

In addition to the presentations this month, the Palm Coast Fire Department increased its presence on social media to share fire prevention safety tips.

Palm Coast debris pickup is ongoing, 60 percent complete

Palm Coast – The City of Palm Coast is 60 percent complete with its first pass through residential neighborhoods to collect debris from Hurricane Irma. The City has been working and will continue to work seven days a week to collect debris. The City estimates that over 16,000 cubic yards of debris have been picked up so far. Due to limited resources available because of this year's active hurricane season, the cleanup is taking longer than previous cleanups. Now that resources are being freed up from other areas, more trucks and crews will be working to accelerate cleanup this weekend and in the coming weeks.

Debris cleanup is a top priority for the City, but cleanup is expected to take several more weeks, and we are asking residents to continue to be patient. The first pass of debris pickup is 100% complete in the following sections of the City: C, K, L, LL, S, U, and Z. The first pass is approximately 75% complete in the B, F, P, and W sections, and the Woodlands neighborhood. Our national hauler, Waste Pro, and City crews will be working to finish those sections and will have a major presence in the remaining sections (E and R) starting this weekend. A map of the previous day's progress is being released on the City's website each weekday afternoon to keep residents informed. **NOTE: In some cases, only a section of the street has been picked up; crews will be returning to pick up the remainder of the street's debris.**

At a later date, the City will announce when the second and final pass for both vegetative and construction and demolition debris will occur.

Pick up routes of household garbage and weekly pickups of bagged/canned yard trash should be back to their normal schedule. If your garbage or bagged/canned yard trash is not picked up on the scheduled day, please leave it at the curb until it is picked up. Also, please call Palm Coast Customer Service at 386-986-2360 to report the delay. The City is working closely with Waste Pro to resolve these issues. Weekly pickups of loose vegetative debris will return to normal once storm debris is picked up.

To expedite debris removal the City asks residents to help by separating everything at the curb into the following categories:

- Vegetative Debris – leaves, logs, plants, tree branches, etc.
- Construction & Demolition Debris – building materials, asphalt shingles, drywall, lumber, metal, plastics, etc.
- Normal Household Trash – Normal household trash and bagged debris of any kind is being picked up by Waste Pro following your normal garbage and yard trash schedule.

If, after large piles of vegetative debris are picked up, smaller debris is left behind, the City asks residents to bag the smaller debris for collection to accelerate cleanup.

Remember, different debris collection trucks are designed to pick up different types of debris. One truck may pick up large logs, but a different truck would pick up smaller branches. Don't worry if a truck passes your pile and doesn't stop to pick it up. Another truck will come - maybe not today, but soon. Debris should be placed on your property near the curb - NOT on the street.

Residents who are having damaged trees removed or trimmed by a tree contractor should be sure the contractor is removing the debris as part of the job.

Commercial businesses, apartments, townhomes, and condominiums are responsible for their own debris cleanup and hauling. Hurricane debris will not be picked up by Waste Pro. Businesses and multi-family residential developments should not place debris at the curb.

The City will be tracking everything so that we can be reimbursed by FEMA.
