New Life Saving Tools Added to the Fire Department:



Used in place of traditional tools, the cordless option for these tools creates a more efficient environment for patient care and communications during a rescue. ## COLORADO DRIVE BRIDGE #734064



Palm Coast Volunteer Firefighter Interns are growing! Three new Volunteer Firefighter Interns started this month.

We have a constant flow of Flagler Palm Coast High School Fire Academy students doing ride alongs with our crews. Many students in the Fire Academy at Flagler Palm Coast High School schedule their ride alongs after school and/or on the weekends.

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The Equipment Team has completed its first major project – to introduce new, battery-operated extrication equipment for use during motor vehicle accidents. Training has been conducted on how to properly and safely use these tools. A second set of battery-operated tools have been ordered and will be installed in another Palm Coast fire engine in the coming months.

## HIGHLIGHTS

- The average water demand for the week was 7.381 million gallons per day.
- The average wastewater flow for the week was 7.392 million gallons per day.
- Crews installed 7 new water meters, 1 new irrigation meter, 4 new PEP tanks and replaced 1 PEP tank.
- Contractors replaced 5 pep tanks.
- There are 17 new PEP tanks pending and 40 PEP tank replacements pending.
- To keep up with builder demand, currently all new tanks are being installed within 3 days of site ready.
- There are 225 new meter installations pending, with 62 cleared and an average installation time of 3 weeks.
- Wastewater crews installed 2 dewatering systems, 1 sewer tap, 5 new PEP pumps, 11 electric assemblies and repaired 4 service laterals.
- Replaced 20 pep pumps, 15 floats, and 10 cleanout caps. Replaced 2 ball valves and boxes.
- There were 49 calls after hours.
- There were 3 water service line replacements and 16 meter pit adjustments, replacements and repairs.
- Water Distribution crews repaired 5 water service lines, 8 water service manifolds and tested and repaired 10 backflow preventers.
- December 14<sup>th</sup>, 2017 staff found the access road to well site LW-14 mounded with asphalt. Someone used a portion of the access road as a dump site. Crew spread the asphalt out using a wheel loader. Water Treatment Plant #2 staff installed a new gate access located at the front of the Belle Terre and LW-14 access road to eliminate anyone from entering the access road without permission.
- On December 19<sup>th</sup>, 2017 at 9:00 a.m. a broken fire hydrant on Filbert Lane was replaced which affected 43 customers for approximately 8 hours.
- On December 20<sup>th</sup>, 2017 at 9:00 a.m. two broken flushing hydrants were replaced with in ground flushing systems on Floral Court and Flame Tree Court. This affected 62 customers for 8 hours which also included Flarestone Court, Flower Hill Lane and Florida Park Drive.

### Recycle your Christmas tree and get free paper shredding service: Jan. 6 event

**Palm Coast** – Mark your calendars now for the Palm Coast holiday tradition that preserves the environment and beautifies our city – the annual Christmas Tree Recycling Event on Saturday, Jan. 6.

Recycle your Christmas tree and receive a free three-gallon evergreen tree in exchange (while supplies last) at the City's 11<sup>th</sup> annual Christmas Tree Recycling Event. The event will be 8 a.m. to 1 p.m., at the Palm Coast Fuel Depot, 22 Utility Drive.

DVD and CD players, keyboards, old wires, cell phones and Christmas tree lights will also be accepted for recycling. No TVs, microwaves, or computer monitors, please.

This year there will also be a free paper-shredding service offered, so bring your old documents for professional shredding. Items that can be accepted include: staples, paper clips, spiral notebooks, expired credit cards, check books, folders with small prongs with small amounts of metal/plastic. Unacceptable items include: batteries, three-ring binders, binder clips, hard drives, X-rays and large amounts of metal/plastic. Shredded materials will be recycled, with the ink and color removed to produce new paper towels, tissues, etc.

All trees donated for recycling will be ground and used as mulch to beautify the parks and trails across Palm Coast. Residents should remove all decorations, lights, tinsel and ornaments from trees prior to donation.

"It helps the environment and saves the City and our residents money by us not having to purchase as much mulch for projects," said Palm Coast Urban Forester Carol Mini. "There are residents who come out year after year for their free tree to plant in their yard."

#### Palm Coast Fire Department Equipment Team selects new cordless extrication tools

**Palm Coast** – In keeping with the City of Palm Coast's overall management strategy, the Palm Coast Fire Department has 14 employee teams that take the lead in everyday operational planning.

One of the newest teams within the department, the Equipment Team, has completed its first major project – to introduce new, battery-operated extrication equipment for use during motor vehicle accidents. These tools are designed for rapid intervention in vehicle rescue and the extrication of trapped victims.

"We instituted the team concept to oversee many area of operations," said Deputy Chief Jerry Forte. "Since 2012 we have had teams oversee apparatus design, public education and Insurance Service Office (ISO) grading."

"These teams and their leaders control the direction and flow of the project from concept to introduction in the field to post-implementation review," Forte said. "It is an innovative approach that gives the employees planning opportunities, introduces them to budget preparation and funding, and allows them to play an active role in the future of the department. It also benefits the City and the Fire Department because we get more input and a variety of perspectives from more employees, who are trained professionals and directly affected by these decisions."

The new Equipment Team was created by the Deputy Fire Chief last year to assess whether current equipment was still relevant to today's operations and to recommend improvements for the future. The team joined with another Fire Department team, the Apparatus Team, to evaluate the current tools' effectiveness and the ergonomics of deployment from fire trucks at emergency scenes and to try new tools now available on the market. The team did in-depth research, including many hours of hands-on practice with options newer to the market.

"Our team wanted to try something new," said Firefighter Adam Bachman, leader for the project. "After meeting with several manufacturers and testing their equipment, we selected the Holmatro extrication tools from their Greenline brand. We are being progressive by choosing battery-powered, cordless tools that are safer for rescuers to use and quicker for helping victims."

"Usually at the scene of a vehicle extrication, the noise is loud due to the extrication equipment's gas-powered portable hydraulic generator, and we have limited mobility because of the connection to the generator," explained Lt. Brian Mugford, Equipment Team leader. "The new, quieter tools make communication at an emergency scene more efficient and the cordless aspect gives us more mobility. That creates a more efficient environment for patient care and communications."

Three battery-powered extrication tools from Holmatro have been installed on one of Palm Coast Fire Department's engines. The tools are spreaders used to separate metal, commonly known as the "Jaws of Life;" cutters that are used to cut door hinges and through the post of a vehicle; and a combination tool that performs both functions. A second set of battery-powered tools have been ordered and will be installed in another Palm Coast fire engine the coming months.

The Fire Department's team model of management has been growing over the past few years and is proving successful across-the-board, said Deputy Chief Forte. The approach was fashioned after the City of Palm Coast's overall team concept, which uses employee teams – usually with employee representatives from different departments – to tackle big projects and find solutions to citywide challenges. It was first implemented by Palm Coast City Manager Jim Landon with the introduction of the LITE Team (Leadership Intern Training Experience) in 2011 and has been successful at developing up-and-coming leaders within Palm Coast city government.

Residents who would like to see the new extrication tools firsthand are invited to visit Fire Station 21 at 9 Corporate Drive (behind Kohl's), Palm Coast.
