





Our Division is for the birds right now! Preparations for the fourth annual Birds of a Feather Fest (Feb. 9-11) are well under way. We're excited about two big additions this year. As part of our Rooted in Nature brand campaign, wildlife photographer and conservationist Moose Peterson will share his photos and the stories behind them in a free lecture for the community at 7 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 10, at Flagler Auditorium. Earlier that same day, the green space behind City Hall will be transformed into PeaCee's Big Backyard, where residents can learn how to make their own backyards more bird- and butterfly-friendly. We'll have two shows by the Audubon Center Birds of Prey, nature-related activities for children, beginner bird walks and more. PeaCee's Big Backyard also is free! See www.birdingfest.com for a full schedule.

Palm Coast Firefighters engaged in the Annual Combat Challenge this week. The instructors put the firefighters to the test by challenging their abilities to perform daily tasks. The annual combat challenge is to encourage firefighter fitness, train in various conditions and scenarios and demonstrate the profession's rigors to the public. Wearing full bunker gear and air pack breathing apparatus the Firefighters are timed as they simulate the physical demands of real-life firefighting by performing a linked series of five tasks known as the Big 5. The Big 5 includes climbing the 5-story tower, hoisting, chopping, dragging hoses and rescuing a life-sized, 175lb “victim” as they race against themselves and the clock.





- The average water demand for the week was 6.756 million gallons per day.
- The average wastewater flow for the week was 7.344 million gallons per day.
- Crews installed 23 new water meters, 1 new PEP tank.
- Crews replaced 1 PEP tank and contractors replaced 5 pep tanks.
- There are 21 new PEP tanks pending and 37 PEP tank replacements pending.
- To keep up with builder demand, currently all new tanks are being installed within 6 days of site ready.
- There are 204 new meter installations pending, with 23 cleared and an average installation time of 3 weeks.
- Wastewater crews installed 1 sewer tap, 4 new PEP pumps, 3 new PEP electric assemblies and repaired 2 service laterals.
- Replaced 25 pep pumps, 21 floats, 1 PEP panel, 4 back lids and 6 cleanout caps. Replaced 3 ball valves and 3 boxes.
- There were 67 calls after hours.
- There were 6 meter pit adjustments, replacements and repairs.
- Water Distribution crews repaired 2 water service lines, 4 water service manifolds, replaced 1 water service line, installed 10 reuse meters, tested and repaired 123 backflow preventers.
- Wastewater crews inspected via CCTV 6,316' feet of gravity sewer and inspected 46 manholes.
- Employees from Water Treatment Plant 1 and 2 attended TECO training. The course is designed for Emergency Responders, Public Works and Utility workers to understand properties and characteristics of natural gas and propane, and the procedures for responding to gas-related emergencies to be better prepared to protect their own lives and those they serve.
- Staff from Water Treatment Plant 3 worked with the City Information Technology department in upgrading the plant computers.

WATER DISTRIBUTION TECHS REPAIR DAMAGED FIRE HYDRANT

Wildlife is here to stay in Florida. We are home to multiple species of wildlife that can live in the wooded lot next to your house. As we force them out of their homes with our development, we will begin to see them out in our yards and streets. There are some diseases that wildlife can carry that is transferrable to humans. Bats, raccoons, and fox are the main vectors of the rabies virus and they can infect a human through bites and scratches. Rabies does not live long outside the host so you don't have to worry if the animal is deceased and you want to bury it. Armadillos can carry leprosy and it can transfer to humans via touch. Fortunately 95% of humans are immune to the disease. Opossums carry multiple parasites that can be transferred to humans via their fecal matter. Wildlife is here to stay so we as humans must do our best to accommodate them while still allowing them to be wild animals.

Registration opens for City of Palm Coast's Birds of a Feather Fest, set for Feb. 9-11

Palm Coast – Registration is now open for the City of Palm Coast's fourth annual Birds of a Feather Fest, set for Feb. 9-11 – offering a weekend of birding, photography, workshops, family activities and a special community presentation for everyone who loves nature and wildlife. A full schedule is at www.birdingfest.com.

Birds of a Feather Fest 2018 is proud to welcome renowned wildlife photographer Moose Peterson, who will give a free community presentation – “An Evening with Moose Peterson” – on Saturday evening, Feb. 10, at the Flagler Auditorium. Peterson will also lead a Sunrise Photography Field Trip to Orlando Wetlands Park during the festival.

The Birds of a Feather Fest is based at Palm Coast City Hall, 160 Lake Ave., Palm Coast. Many activities are free, while some have a fee. There is no registration fee. The three-day birding and nature festival is geared toward serious birders, as well as beginners and families. A good number of the birding trips offered will be on paved trails in and around Palm Coast, making birding accessible to children and people with disabilities.

A complete schedule for the Birds of a Feather Fest is at www.birdingfest.com, and registration is now open. Twenty-three birding trips and classes are being offered. Participants can choose as much or as little as they'd like over the three days.

New this year is PeaCee's Big Backyard behind Palm Coast City Hall on Saturday, Feb. 10. This backyard-sized interactive exhibit will allow festival-goers of all ages explore how to attract birds and butterflies to their own backyards. The Audubon Center for Birds of Prey will set up in PeaCee's Big Backyard and give two shows, and there will be a full array of nature-related children's activities all for free. Four free beginner bird walks will start from City Hall at 8 and 10 a.m., noon and 2 p.m. that day.

Other new features for 2018 are a big trip to Lake Apopka Wildlife Drive; a bird walk at Pelicer Creek Conservation Area; classes on iPhoneography, Pokemon Go (for birding) and Building a Bird-Friendly Backyard; and a behind-the-scenes reception with Moose Peterson before his Saturday night community presentation. The popular Introduction to Birding, eBirding and Bird Identification workshops will also be offered.

“We are so excited to have legendary wildlife photographer Moose Peterson as our keynote speaker and photography workshop leader here for our fourth annual Birds of a Feather Fest,” said Event Coordinator Jason Giraulo, the City’s Digital Communications Coordinator. “His participation this year is a testament to the quality of birding in our community and helps us achieve our goal to bring world-class trips and classes to Flagler County.”

In addition to Peterson leading the big trip to Orlando Wetlands Park, returning this year as expert birding guides are internationally known birder Greg Miller, whose story was the subject of *The Big Year* motion picture starring Jack Black; David and Dee Simpson of Space Coast Audubon (David is the current holder of the American Birding Association’s Big Year for Florida); David Hartgrove, longtime Volusia County compiler for the North American Migration Count; Joe and Judie Dziak, Flagler’s resident bald eagle experts; Michael Brothers of the Marine Science Center in Ponce Inlet; and Flagler Audubon members Mary Giraulo, Frank Quinn and Mary Kronenberg. A new guide joining the festival is Gallus Quigley, a guide who’s seen 431 species in Florida and leads birding trips to the Dry Tortugas. A free reception Friday evening at Green Lion Café at Palm Harbor Golf Club will give everyone an opportunity to meet the experts.

Birders will love the guided trips to top birding sites in Central and Northeast Florida. In addition to Orlando Wetlands Park, this year’s big trips are to Merritt Island National Wildlife Refuge, Lake Apopka Wildlife Drive, Paynes Prairie Preserve, Viera Wetlands, Talbot Island State Park, Lyonia Preserve and Sweetwater Wetlands. Trips are also planned to Flagler County’s own Princess Place Preserve, Matanzas Inlet, Pelicer Creek Conservation Area, the GTM NERR Dam entrance and Palm Coast’s Central Park. The Gull Fly-In at Frank Rendon Park in Daytona Beach Shores will be back this year, as well.

“We are building on the successes of our first three years to offer great trips by well-known birding guides for serious birders, along with introductory walks for people who want to learn or are just getting started,” Giraulo said. “We also have a fun event planned on Saturday to show people how they can experience great birding in their own backyards.”
