Spotlight Projects

Wastewater Treatment Plant No. 2 is in Operational and Testing Mode!

Wastewater Treatment Plant No. 2 and its associated projects are now in operational and testing mode! Last week, the new Wastewater Treatment Plant, the Matanzas Master Pump Station and associated reclaimed and force mains were placed in operation. A portion of the wastewater flows going to the existing Wastewater Treatment Plant were redirected to the Matanzas Master Pump Station which supplies wastewater to the head of the plant. The new treatment plant, located near Water Treatment Plant No. 3 off of US-1, is one of the first membrane bioreactor filtration systems in operation in Florida and can treat up to 2 million gallons per day. Operations staff is familiarizing themselves with the equipment and adjusting treatment processes to achieve optimum efficiency. The City is planning to hold a Ribbon Cutting ceremony soon.

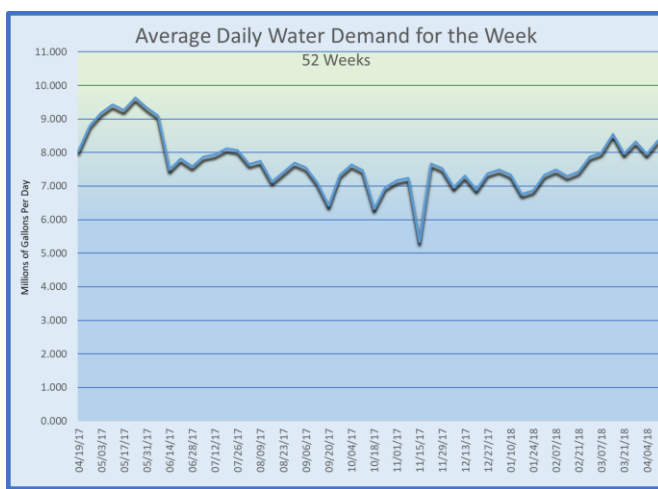

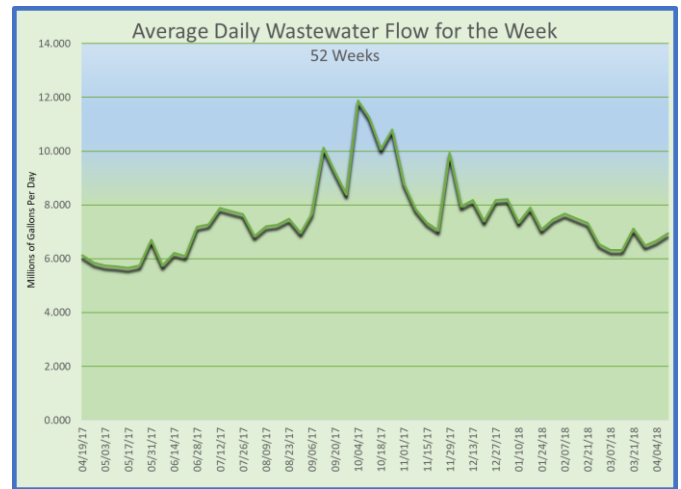

- The average water demand for the week was 7.550 million gallons per day.
- The average wastewater flow for the week was 6.940 million gallons per day.
- Crews installed 20 new water meters, 2 new irrigation meters, 1 new reuse meter and 1 new PEP tank.
- Crews replaced 4 PEP tanks.
- There are 24 new PEP tanks pending and 9 PEP tanks replacements pending.
- Currently all new tanks are being installed within 1 day of site ready.
- There are 240 new meter installations pending, with 65 cleared and an average installation time of 3 weeks.
- Wastewater crews installed 19 PEP electrical assemblies and 2 risers. Repaired 1 service lateral and 1 PEP main.
- Also replaced 32 PEP pumps, 25 floats, 1 back lid, 2 ball valves, 2 boxes and 8 cleanout caps.
- There were 40 calls after hours.
- There were 7 meter pit adjustments, replacements and repairs.
- Water Distribution crews repaired 7 water service manifolds and 1 water service line.
- Tested and repaired 133 backflow preventers.
- Wastewater crews inspected via CCTV 8,101 feet of gravity sewer. Also completed 3 pump stations annual maintenance inspections and inspected 30 manholes.
- On April 5th, one of the staff from Water Treatment Plant # 3 presented a wetland presentation at Linear Park to the Old King Elementary 1st graders. The presentation was for the Children Helping in Resource Planning “CHIRP” program. This program involves an enthusiastic learning project that draws attention to environmental issues.
- Crews activated the wet weather operations protocol on Monday, Tuesday, and part of Wednesday due to the 7 inches of rainfall event which started late Monday and continued into Wednesday.
- Crews delivered 300 door tags for upcoming smoke testing scheduled to start on 4/23 in Section 4.

This year’s “Stop the Drops” campaign runs through the end of April.

In return, residents can win \$5,000 toward their home Utility payments, water saving fixtures, and hundreds of other prizes. Plus, one lucky charity will receive a 2018 Toyota RAV4 Hybrid to serve the community.

The annual Wyland Mayor’s Challenge for Water Conservation during the month of April is a non-profit national community service campaign to see which leaders can best inspire their residents to make a series of informative and easy-to-do online pledge to use water more efficiently, reduce pollution and save energy.

This will be Palm Coast’s fourth year to participate in the national competition, and the City was proud to come in 17th in the nation for cities with a population of 30,000-99,999 in 2017.

“Part of our City’s vision is to protect the environment and beauty of Palm Coast while conserving natural resources,” said Mayor Holland. “Managing our water resources carefully is especially important for us here in Florida because our fresh water supply is limited, and we do go through periods of drought conditions that impact our aquifer.”

Last year, residents from over 4,800 cities in all 50 U.S. states pledged to reduce their annual consumption of freshwater by 2.2 billion gallons, reduce waste sent to landfills by 52 million pounds, and prevent more than 114,000 pounds of hazardous waste from entering our watersheds. The Challenge goes beyond drought issues and looks at the ways our water use will affect the future of our communities – from how we grow food to reducing polluted runoff.

Mayor Holland is urging everyone to go online during the month of April to take the National Mayor’s Challenge for Water Conservation.

“We like to say Palm Coast is ‘Rooted in Nature.’ Our entire community is built on those values, and water conservation is a big part of that commitment,” she said. “Let’s aim to ‘Stop the Drops’ and be No. 1 in the nation this year!”

To participate, residents enter online at www.mywaterpledge.com and then make a series of online pledges to conserve water on behalf of the City of Palm Coast. Cities compete in the following population categories: (5,000-29,999 residents, 30,000-99,999 residents, 100,000-299,999 residents, 300,000-599,999 residents, and 600,000+ residents). The City of Palm Coast has approximately 85,000 residents.

Cities with the highest percentage of residents who take the Challenge in their population category are entered into drawings for hundreds of eco-friendly prizes, including home improvement gift cards, home irrigation equipment, and the Grand Prize \$5,000 Home Utility Bill Payment. The Challenge also gives residents a chance to nominate a deserving charity that would benefit from receiving a 2018 Toyota RAV4 Hybrid, and features additional resources for residents to take their commitment of conservation even further, from regional water and energy resource issues to cost-saving tips at home.

The 7th National Mayor’s Challenge for Water Conservation is presented by the Wyland Foundation and Toyota, with support from the U.S EPA WaterSense, The Toro Company, National League of Cities, Conserva Irrigation, and Earth Friendly Products (makers of ECOS).

Founded in 1993 by environmental artist Wyland (best known for his series of 100 monumental marine life murals), the Wyland Foundation is a 501c3 non-profit organization dedicated to promoting, protecting, and preserving the world’s ocean, waterways and marine life. The foundation encourages environmental awareness through community events, education programs, and public art projects. Learn more at www.wylandfoundation.org.

All year long, but especially during Water Conservation Month in April, the City provides water conservation information through its Facebook page at www.facebook.com/discoverpalmcoast.

Here are some tips to help Palm Coast residents stop the drops, saving water and money in the process:

- Turn off the water while you brush your teeth, wash your face, shave, wash dishes or clean the house. The average faucet flows at a rate of 2 gallons per minute.
- Take a shower instead of a bath – baths use up to 70 gallons of water, whereas a 5-minute shower uses only 10-25 gallons.
- A running toilet can waste up to 200 gallons of water per day. At 1 drip per second, a faucet can leak 3,000 gallons per year. Repair leaks right away!
- For washing machines with variable settings, select the minimum amount required per load. Otherwise, wash only full loads.
- Select native-Florida trees and shrubs that need less watering when landscaping.
- Install low-flow toilets and showerheads to dramatically reduce your indoor water consumption without reduced performance.
- Run the dishwasher instead of washing by hand. It uses less hot water and could save you \$40 a year.

Solar trees, canopies now shading Palm Coast through FPL's SolarNow program

Palm Coast – The City of Palm Coast is participating in FPL's SolarNow program – bringing a new kind of solar to life that harnesses the energy from the sun while providing Palm Coast residents and visitors with covered parking and shade at Palm Coast parks.

Three distinctive and innovative solar trees have been “planted” at Central Park in Town Center, and a solar canopy has been installed over the front parking lot at the Palm Coast Community Center. A second solar canopy will soon be added over the parking area near the baseball fields at Holland Park. The solar trees have USB connections that can be used by park visitors to charge their mobile devices.

“The sun shines abundantly in Palm Coast, and we’re committed to protecting our natural environment for future generations. So we are excited to bring FPL’s SolarNow program to our City,” said City Administration Coordinator Denise Bevan, who leads the Green Team.

“For a number of years, Palm Coast has championed the creation of a sustainable framework to encourage our community to care for land, water, air and wildlife,” Bevan said. “SolarNow is a natural extension of the many innovative ‘green city’ initiatives and programs we already have.”

Thanks to SolarNow and its more than 30,000 participants statewide, Palm Coast now has 217 solar panels powering the grid with 60 kW of clean energy and providing 26 vehicles with shade at the Community Center. With the canopy at Holland Park and the trees at Central Park, Palm Coast will be harnessing more than 100 kW of solar power with about 361 solar panels – enough to power about 12 homes!

“There are a lot of factors that played into our decision to partner with Palm Coast on these projects, but the most important is our shared commitment to sustainability,” said Cory Ramsel, Senior Director of FPL Project Development. “We’re excited to add Palm Coast to our growing SolarNow family – a network of zoos, parks and museums that have become living classrooms for people of all ages.”

The new solar canopies generate zero-emissions energy and add an educational and interactive component to solar. The canopies’ design allows solar to be easily integrated into urban landscapes at parks, zoos, museums, schools and now, the Palm Coast Community Center and Holland Park.

The FPL SolarNow program offers people an opportunity to see and learn about solar up close – something many have never experienced because solar panels are usually located out of sight on rooftops or at universal solar energy centers like the ones FPL is building across the state.

The voluntary SolarNow program allows FPL customers who support solar and want to see it in their local communities, an opportunity to do so by electing to contribute \$9 on their monthly bill. More than 200 households in Palm Coast participate in the program.

Palm Coast's solar trees and canopies are the first in Flagler County, but SolarNow is sprouting up all across Florida. The City of South Daytona has four solar trees, and the program is coming to St. Augustine this spring.

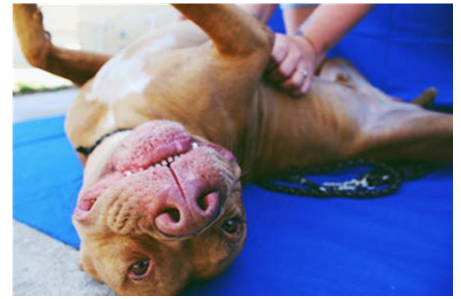
