Palm Coast Man Recognizes His Life Savers By Patrick Juliano, Fire Public Information Officer

When cardiac arrest occurs, every second counts. That was true for Palm Coast resident Serge Judro, who has lived to share his story. Palm Coast Fire Chief Mike Beadle and the Palm Coast City Council

Palm Coast Fire Chief Mike Beadle and the Palm Coast City Council recently recognized the Palm Coast Fire crew and four local residents for their roles in saving

their roles in saving Judro's life.



Judro wasn't feeling well when he went to work Feb. 15, but he didn't realize he was experiencing signs of a heart attack, known medically as Acute Myocardial Infarction.

His coworkers didn't notice anything wrong until Judro collapsed. They called 911 and immediately began CPR.

Upon arrival of Palm Coast Fire Engine 21, the crew of Lt. Daniel Driscoll, Driver Engineer Adam Bachman and Firefighter-Paramedic Kalin Graham found Judro in cardiac arrest. So it was fortunate that Judro received CPR performed by his coworkers.

So it was fortunate that Judro received CPR performed by his coworkers. Upon arrival, Firefighter-Paramedic Graham led the resuscitation efforts, assisted by the Flagler County Fire Rescue 21 crew that responded in an ambulance. They performed Advanced Cardiac Life Support (ACLS) interventions including manual defibrillation, intravenous drug therapy, airway intubation and maintaining high quality CPR. Their efforts resulted in Judro regaining a pulse and spontaneous breathing. The physicians and staff at Plorida Hospital Flagler continued post-resuscitation care, and Judro has since been released from the hospital.

Chief Beadle presented lifesaving awards to Sandvik employees Nate Kife, Gene Kleinschmit, Tricia Pacionis and Lori Scorpio, saying not all first responders are firefighters. Driscoll, Bachman and Graham of Palm Coast Engine 21 received a Unit Citation.

Presentation to the Rotary Club of Flagler County: Tree Pruning Basics and City Regulations


A member of the Planning Division, the City's Landscape Architect – Bill Butler, was the featured speaker at the luncheon meeting of the Rotary Club of Flagler County to show pictures and discuss the why, how and when of tree pruning. Also discussed were planting tips and what City regulations are in place to control over pruning. Assistance in the form of making like a tree, was provided by our City Fire Chief and Rotary member Mike Beadle! The Chief's arm was an example of where to make cuts in order to remove a lateral branch properly (the arm was not actually cut!). The Club was very interested in the discussion and learned quite a lot on how to manage their trees on the commercial property they might own as well as their home sites.

<u>Presentation to the Savannah</u> <u>Square Homeowner's Association:</u>

Another presentation was made this week by Planning Division member and Landscape Architect, Bill Butler, at the May meeting of the Savannah Square Homeowner's Association to answer questions the group had on tree removals, tree pruning, lawn care and how to select a landscape maintenance firm. Also discussed was what can be done to manage the undeveloped common area and what areas might have restrictions such as wetlands and conservation easements. The group was appreciative of the City's willingness to take the time to talk with them and applauded all the beautification efforts that the City has done over the years.

- The average water demand for the week was 6.809 million gallons per day.
- The average wastewater flow for the week was 8.901 million gallons per day.
- Crews installed 21 new water meters and 1 new irrigation meter.
- Contractors installed 4 new PEP tanks.
- There are 17 new PEP tanks pending and 17 PEP tank replacements pending. Currently all new tanks are being installed within 4 days of site ready.
- There are 240 new meter installations pending, with 30 cleared and an average installation time of 3 weeks.
- Wastewater crews installed 8 PEP electric assemblies and 1 riser.
- Replaced 25 PEP pumps, 28 floats, 1 back lid, 1 ball valve, 1 box and 3 cleanout caps. Repaired 3 service laterals and 1 gravity main.
- There were 52 calls after hours.
- Water Distribution crews repaired 2 water service lines, 5 manifolds, completed 12 meter pit adjustments/replacements and replaced 1 water service line. Tested and repaired 118 backflow preventers.
- Wastewater crews inspected via CCTV 3,385 feet of gravity sewer mains and 15 manholes.
- On May 22nd Water Distribution repaired a fire hydrant located on Woodborn Lane by replacing a stem coupling that opens and closes the hydrant. A 2 day boil water notice was issued for 28 homes.
- On May 21st staff from Water Treatment Plant #2 re-programmed the new variable frequency drive at (LW) Limestone Well -23. Staff disinfected the well and collected the required sets of bacteriological samples for well clearance.
- Staff from Wastewater Operations delivered 647 door tags for pending smoke testing in Section 8.

Palm Coast announces temporary modification of disinfection treatment procedures

Palm Coast – In order to maintain the reliability of the water distribution system serving Palm Coast Utility, the town of Marineland and Flagler County Utilities customers who live in Painters Hill and Beverly Beach, the City of Palm Coast Utility Department will temporarily change the disinfection process for its potable (drinking water) water supply.

From June 6 to 26, the City will disinfect the water with free chlorine rather than combined chlorine/ammonia (chloramines). During this period, customers may experience a slight increase in the taste and odor of chlorine.

The periodic and temporary conversion from chloramines, which are a longer-lasting disinfectant, to free chlorine, which is a stronger disinfectant, helps to ensure the quality of the drinking water in the distribution system. The maintenance program, which is a normal procedure for water systems, is supported by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection and will include daily testing to monitor water quality and measure the effectiveness of the program. After this process is completed, Palm Coast Utility will revert to disinfection by the chloramines method.

Customers on dialysis who use a proportioning machine to prepare dialysate are advised to contact their physician to obtain the appropriate steps to accommodate the change in water disinfection. Customers who have fish tanks or aquatic species are advised to contact a professional aquarist to avoid any problems associated with chlorine.
