


Wawa Front Building Elevations





- The average water demand for the week was 8.183 million gallons per day.
- The average wastewater flow for the week was 7.194 million gallons per day.
- Crews installed 11 new water meters.
- There are 250 new meter installations pending, with 50 cleared and an average installation time of 4 weeks.
- Installed 11 new PEP tanks and replaced 4 tanks.
- There are 40 new PEP tanks pending and 13 PEP tank replacements pending. Currently all new tanks are being installed within 8 days of site ready.
- There were 67 calls after hours.
- Water Distribution crews repaired 4 water service lines, 4 manifolds, completed 9 meter pit adjustments/replacements and tested and repaired 104 backflow preventers.
- Wastewater crews installed 2 risers, replaced 6 PEP pumps, 3 floats, 2 cleanout caps, 2 back lids, 1 ball valve and box, 1 PEP panel and repaired 3 service laterals.
- Completed 2 pump stations annual maintenance inspections and 8 manholes.
- On September 4th, staff from Water Treatment Plant #2 and 3 attended a tour of the Jacksonville Electric Authority pilot plant on converting wastewater streams into potable drinking water.
- On Wednesday, September 5th, Brian Matthews organized a special training session with the operators employed by the St. Johns County Utility Department to help them understand the Lime Softening process. The tour began at 9:00 am and was given by our Water Treatment Plant #1 Chief Operator Donnie Holcomb along with Brian Matthews. The tour involved a discussion on the lime softening process including chemistry, rapid mix, coagulation, flocculation, sedimentation and the sludge handling process. Also discussed the filtration process including backwash and recovery, disinfection process and lab testing of different process parameters at different stages of treatment. Peter Roussell gave a formal technical training on the chemistry of lime softening which included a Power Point Presentation. A portion of the topics included the relationship between chemical states of alkalinity. The class was well received.



HIGHLIGHTS WATER QUALITY UNIDIRECTIONAL FLUSHING BEGINS

The Water Quality Division has begun the unidirectional flushing which is a methodical approach to distribution system and water quality maintenance. The process involves designed sequences to open and close valves and hydrants for the entire system flushing from potable water source outward. This week the Water Quality staff concentrated work in the "P" section. Because this type of flushing can temporarily discolor tap water, our staff notified the customers in that area by phone and ones that could not be reached a door tag was issued for that resident. Sections of the distribution system will be flushed according to program design and will continue until completion.

All invited to Farewell Reception for Palm Coast's first Mayor, James Canfield

Palm Coast – The City of Palm Coast's first Mayor, James V. Canfield, will soon be relocating to Maryland to be closer to his family, and the public is invited to a celebratory sendoff at a Farewell Reception set for 2 to 4 p.m. Friday, Sept. 21, at Palm Coast City Hall, 160 Lake Ave.

Canfield's friends and colleagues will share memories and make presentations; the formal program will begin at 3 p.m. Members of the public will also have an opportunity to share memories and well wishes.

Several organizations in which Canfield has been involved during his nearly 30 years in Palm Coast are presenting the reception. They include Friends of Golf and Tennis, the Irish Social Club, the Palm Coast Elks Lodge, the Palm Coast Historical Society and Sludgehammers Golf.

Canfield retired to Palm Coast from his home state of New York in 1989 following a distinguished career as a teacher, principal and superintendent in the New York City School System. He was instrumental in directing a grassroots Home Rule Coalition that led to the City's 1999 incorporation as an official municipal government. Once the citizens of Palm Coast voted to incorporate, they elected Canfield from a group of nine candidates to be the first to lead the City.

During his seven-year tenure, Mayor Canfield helped manage unprecedented growth in the City. Palm Coast was the fastest-growing small city in the nation in 2006. The Mayor and City Council's challenge during that time was to guide the City through its epic growth while also maintaining the integrity of its highly sought-after quality of life.

Over the years, Canfield has remained active in many civic organizations. He is a regular at community events.

City of Palm Coast releases 2018 Annual Floodplain Management Report

Palm Coast – The City of Palm Coast has completed its 2018 Annual Floodplain Management Report, which details the City's efforts to protect citizens and property from flooding disasters.

The report has been posted on the City website, and all are invited to review it at www.palmcoastgov.com/flood-prep.

Of note this year is that new Flood Insurance Rate Maps took effect across Flagler County on June 6. For residents who have a mortgage on their homes, if your property was rezoned to a flood hazard area during that process, you may have already received a letter from your lending institution explaining the requirement to obtain flood insurance. But for homeowners who don't have a mortgage, the City of Palm Coast recommends you check the new Flood Zone Maps to determine whether your property was rezoned to a higher risk flood hazard area.

To determine if your floodplain designation has changed, contact the City floodplain managers, and they will issue a flood zone determination letter for your property at no cost. The contact is City Administration Coordinator Denise Bevan at dbevan@palmcoastgov.com and 386-986-2458.

"Nearly 25 percent of all flood-related insurance claims come from a moderate- to low-risk area, which shows flooding can occur anywhere," said Bevan, a Certified Floodplain Manager who coordinates the City's program. "Flood insurance is the best way to protect yourself and your family from devastating financial loss. Standard homewoners insurance doesn't cover damage due to flooding."

The City works as part of the Flagler County Local Mitigation Strategy Working Group to evaluate mitigation actions that can help reduce the risk of flooding and other recognized hazards.

Each year, the City does numerous capital projects, such as bridge rehabilitation and reconstruction of water control structures, replaces older stormwater pipes, and performs maintenance on the drainage system including swales, ditches and canals. The City's certified floodplain managers do community outreach to educate citizens about flood hazards and the National Flood Insurance Program.

The City does the Annual Floodplain Management Report each year as part of requirements to maintain a specific status in order to provide discounts on certain flood insurance premiums for citizens who might live in specific flood hazard areas.

The report explains the City's participation in the Community Rating System (CRS) of the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). Since May 2017, Palm Coast residents have benefitted from an additional discount in flood insurance premiums. For insurance holders located within a special flood hazard area (A and AE zones), a 30-percent reduction will be applied at renewal which is an average savings of \$120 per policy. For properties outside a special flood hazard area, a 10-percent discount will remain the same. No discounts are applicable to those holders of preferred risk policies, which are already significantly discounted.
