Twelve Annual Christmas Tree Recycling Event

On Saturday, January 5th the 12th
Annual Christmas Tree Recycling
Event was held. City staff took in 195
Christmas trees, 5,000 pounds of paper
for shredding and 964 pounds of
household electronics.
In exchange for the expired holiday
trees, the City gave away 160, 3 gallon
evergreen native trees to residents.
Also residents received a reusable bag
from the Utility Department,
promoting "Go Paperless" billing. The
new initiative encourages residents to
sign up for electronic correspondence
and billing, to cut down on the use of



paper.

A Technical Site Plan was approved for a parking lot expansion for the existing Seventh Day Adventist Church located at 5650 Belle Terre Parkway. The parking lot will be constructed in two phases with Phase 1 having 91 parking spaces and Phase 2 having 78 additional spaces for a total of 169 parking spaces. The City Council previously approved a shared parking agreement on this twoacre parcel that is owned by the City with the parking lot to be constructed by the Church. In brief, the agreement allows the Church to utilize the parking for services and the City to utilize the parking for a potential future City park located on 28.7 acres of land directly to the north and east of the shared parking lot.

GUIDANCE

Tip of the Month:

Clean Dryer Vents – Clothes dryers often start fires in residential areas. Clean the lint filter every time you start a load of clothes to dry or after the drying cycle is complete. Make sure your exhaust duct is made of metal tubing and not plastic or foil. Clean the exhaust duct with a good quality dryer vent brush to prevent blockage & check for lint build up behind the dryer at least twice a year.





- Utility received the 2018 Sanitary Survey Results from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection for all three Water Treatment Plants and associated well-sites. All sites are in compliance with the Department's drinking water rules and regulations.
- Unidirectional flushing operation will start up again next week on January 14, 2019. Flushing will begin in the Crossings Subdivision and the crew will continue in Section 57 which includes the streets surrounding Seminole Woods, Ulaturn, Citation Boulevard and the south end of Belle Terre Boulevard.
- The average water demand for this week was 7.431 million gallons per day.
- The average wastewater flow for the week was 7.424 million gallons per day.
- Water Distribution crews installed 33 new water meters.
- There are 231 new meter installations pending with 43 cleared and an average installation time of 4 weeks.
- Wastewater Operations installed 13 new PEP tanks and replaced 3 tanks.
- There are 21 new PEP tanks pending and 4 PEP tank replacements pending. Currently all new tanks are being installed within 6 days of site ready.
- There were 151 calls after hours.
- Water Distribution crews replaced 1 water service line, repaired 7 water service lines, 5 manifolds, completed 21 meter pit adjustments/replacements and tested and repaired 139 backflow preventers.
- Wastewater crews replaced 33 PEP pumps, 2 PEP panels, 6 ball valves and boxes, 43 floats, 4 back lids and 10 cleanout caps. Crews installed 5 risers, 11 new PEP pump assemblies and 11 PEP pump electric assemblies and repaired 2 service laterals, 4 PEP mains and 1 gravity main. Inspected via CCTV 7,415 feet of gravity sewer, 33 manholes and 5 annual maintenance pump station inspections.
- On January 8th, staff from Water Distribution repaired a broken coupling on a full size hydrant located on Flint Hill Lane. There were 19 homes issued a 2-day precautionary boil water notice until lab samples confirmed the water was safe to drink.
- T Wayne Hill Trucking continues to remove wet sludge at 2 loads per day from Water Treatment Plant #1.
- Phase 1 Wellfield road located behind Water Treatment Plant #3
 was improved so City vehicles and well driller trucks could
 safely access the area. Improvements were made by spreading
 and compacting asphalt millings to widen and strengthen the
 road at the entrance.
- Suez Company cleaned and inspected the interior of the 1.0
 million gallon storage tank at Water Treatment Plant #1. The
 operation involved draining the tank, removing accumulated
 sediment from the bottom and pressure washing the interior
 followed by disinfection and lab testing to assure water quality.

On December 27th, Wastewater Operations staff repaired a reclaim water service line located in the **Grand Landings** subdivision. The service line distributes highly treated wastewater that is used as a replacement for potable water for irrigation purposes. The line separated from the main pipe and staff had to remove a portion of a resident's driveway in order to access the repair. The line repair took approximately 5 hours to complete.









On January 3^{rd,} Wastewater Operations staff repaired a damaged 4 inch sewer lateral (a pipeline connecting a property to the main sewer line) located on Lafayette Lane. A portion of the resident's driveway had to be removed in order to access the damaged line. The repair took approximately 6 hours to complete.









• On January 7th, staff from Wastewater Operations replaced a broken gravity sewer main pipe located on Plateau Lane. The existing sewer pipe was constructed with clay pipe, which is an earlier infrastructure of sewer pipes. PVC pipe was used to replace the damaged section. The road was closed temporarily at the location of the repair and reopened on January 9th.









• On January 8th, staff from Water Distribution repaired a water main break located at White Dove Lane due to a 6 inch Tee connection that was leaking. The Tee was replaced along with an isolation valve for the hydrant. There were 34 homes without water service for 4 hours and a precautionary boil water notice was issued for 2 days until lab samples confirmed the water was safe to drink.









Water Distribution

On January 9th, staff from Water Distribution responded to a pipe failure on the main water line serving Sea Colony. The pipe failed while the contractor was working on the storm water project for the county. The contractor repaired the valve which took approximately 6 hours. There were 360 homes without water service during the repair, and door tags were issued along with reverse 911 to inform residents of the water interruption and a 2 day precautionary boil water notice was issued until lab samples confirmed the water was safe to drink.



PSI Water Technologies, Inc. conducted a training session on January 9th for managing chlorination and new technology that is used to prevent nitrification. The class explained methods used to balance the equilibrium between ammonia, chlorine, and chloramines. The chemistry of thrihalomethane production potential, chloramines, understanding mixing technology for proper chloramine control. Nitrite development in distribution systems was also covered in the 2 hour long class held at Water Treatment Plant #3.

Palm Coast – See the rising stars of men's tennis from around the world Monday, Jan. 21, through Sunday, Jan. 27, at the Palm Coast Men's 25K: A USTA M25 Event at the Palm Coast Tennis Center, 1290 Belle Terre Parkway. The pro tournament has a new name this year!

This is the City of Palm Coast's 10th year hosting the tournament, and USTA will be presenting Palm Coast an award for that achievement.

This year the Tennis Center has qualified to host a higher-level tournament with a \$25,000 purse (as opposed to a \$15,000 purse) – bringing in a greater caliber of players and offering an even more competitive event.

Making stops in local communities across the United States, the USTA M25 Event is the pathway to the professional ranks for the next generation of world-class players. Here in Palm Coast, up to 50 touring professionals will compete at the City's outstanding clay court facility for a \$25,000 purse and the ranking points players need to ascend to the next level.

Spectator admission is free Jan. 21-24. Also free is Net Generation Kid's Day at 9 a.m. Jan. 26, where children 16 years and under will have fun and games on-court with the head pro of the Palm Coast Tennis Center as well as USTA pros! Advance registration for Net Generation Kid's Day is recommended at www.parksandrec.fun/events.

Events Jan. 25-27 require tickets at \$5 non-member adult, \$3 Tennis Center pass holder, \$3 children ages 10-17, and free for kids under 10. Tickets are valid for the whole day. Tickets are available for purchase daily at the front desk or in advance at www.parksandrec.fun/events.

Tickets to participate in the Pro-Am Event on Jan. 22 are \$35; advance registration is required and can be done so at www.parksandrec.fun/events or at the Palm Coast Tennis Center. Play right alongside touring professionals!

"For 10 years, this event has been a staple in the community that many people take pride in," Washington said. "As part of the 10-year celebration, we are also revamping our Kid's Day. On Saturday, Jan. 26, we are partnering with USTA's Net Generation to provide a kid's clinic, pizza, ice cream, and fun activities for all to enjoy. We hope families will stick around to enjoy the Semi-Finals matches going on later that same day."

The USTA Pro Circuit is the largest developmental tennis circuit in the world and has launched the careers of such current stars as Victoria Azarenka, John Isner, Mardy Fish, Andy Murray, Maria Sharapova and Caroline Wozniacki, as well as past champions Andre Agassi, Jim Courier, Lindsay Davenport, Justine Henin and Pete Sampras.

In 2015, Palm Coast resident Reilly Opelka played in the tournament after receiving the Main Draw Wild Card from USTA. Later that year, Opelka won the Junior Wimbledon tournament, defeating the No. 1-ranked junior. He is now a professional tennis player. This year, we have some returning players from last year's tournament: Harrison Adams (USA), Louis Wessels (Ger), Alessandro Petrone (Ita), Alejandor Gomez (Col), Pavel Krainik (Can), Or Ram-Harel (Isr), Ricardo Rodriguez (Ven), Trent Bryde (USA), Jauma Pla Malfeito (Esp), and Strong Kirchheimer (USA).

City offices to close to commemorate Martin Luther King Jr. Day

Palm Coast – All City of Palm Coast offices will be closed Monday, Jan. 21, to commemorate the national Martin Luther King Jr. Day holiday. Offices will re-open on Tuesday, Jan. 22, at 8 a.m. Trash collection will proceed according to the regular schedule.

Boil Water Notice issued for Sea Colony subdivision due to water line failure

The Sea Colony subdivision is experiencing a temporary water outage as of 11 a.m. Wednesday, Jan. 9, due to a valve failure on a water line on Bay Road in the Hammock. The City of Palm Coast Utility Department, which provides water service to the subdivision, expects to restore water service by this evening (Jan. 9).

Once water is turned back on, a Precautionary Boil Water Notice will be in place for the 360 homes in Sea Colony. This is due to the temporary loss of pressure in portions of the water distribution system.

Until further notice, tap water to be used for consumption and cooking purposes must be boiled at a rolling boil for a minimum of one minute. It is OK to use tap water for bathing and laundry, but tap water should not be used for dish-washing by hand.

The Palm Coast Utility Department will flush the affected lines and collect two consecutive days of bacteriological samples as soon as all flushing and disinfection is completed. This is a precautionary measure to ensure that the water meets all safe drinking water standards. The notice will remain in effect until satisfactory results from bacteriological samples are received. At that time, the boil water notice will be rescinded and the affected customers will be notified.

Are there benefits to having natural wildlife in your surroundings? Of course! Raccoons prefer a variety of foods which will help keep your yard free of pests. They eat wasp larvae and small rodents so these will be cleared from your property. Opossums will eradicate ticks and help to prevent Lyme disease. They also catch and eat cockroaches, rats, and mice. They will take care of any dead animals as well. Don't forget about bats and the 1,200 insects that they can eat in an hour. They love to consume mosquitos and can help to keep the population at bay. The Flagler Humane Society advocates that wildlife be able to stay where they belong as humans have moved into their territory. We do understand that sometimes sick or injured wildlife need a humane ending but recommend that any other "nuisance" wildlife be relocated if possible.
