What can be adopted?

SHORELINES

Track and collect the litter along the City's major outlets to the ocean, including: <u>Long Creek Nature Preserve</u> and <u>Waterfront Park</u>.

If you use a boat, kayak or canoe you can have access more areas where floating debris is present.

Any fishing line found should be placed in a separate bag for recycling or in a fishing line recycling container.

Awareness of wildlife, such as snakes and alligators, is required to ensure your safety.

Please make sure that any recyclables you find make it into the correct bin. Without your help these items are just

> Roadways available for adoption are mainly major parkways and roadways where homes and businesses do not front the roadway's rights-of-way.

ROADS

SR100, US1 and similar roads are not Cityowned. These roads are not adoptable.

The main objective is litter removal. Tires, batteries, broken glass, road debris or large objects blocking the roadway should be reported to the City for removal.

Avoid roadside ditches with tall grass, as you may find snakes. Volunteers should put safety first!



The City of Palm Coast has over 125 miles of trails!

Litter collection along the trails is needed to keep them looking as attractive as possible.

Trails may also have small branches, palm fronds or erosion issues. The group can throw small branches to the side, but large branches or erosion should be reported to the City for correction.

BENCHES



Flowers are planted with the benches along stretches of City trails and parks.

Here, weeding, plant replacement and minor tree trimming is needed.

PARKS

Palm Coast has 14 City parks!

Adoption opportunities in these green spaces include litter pickup, and general policing to report vandalism, broken play equipment, etc. for correction by City staff.

Any planting work, bench dedication or planned tree or shrub trimming must be pre-approved by City staff.
