Save the Environment; Save Money... New Recycle/Waste Programs

Recycling has always been the right thing to do, so wait until you see what's coming next.

Beginning June 1st, Palm Coast residents will receive retail/restaurant discount coupon rewards for recycling. Prior to June 1st, Waste Pro will be distributing a new, larger recycle bin to every resident. This new bin will have a computer chip/bar code that will identify each residential address. Each time the recycle collector stops at your home, an electronic device on the truck will read your bar code and you'll receive credit for recycling on that specific day. The more often you recycle, the larger the reward! Those who recycle most frequently will be eligible for quarterly drawings for prizes. Remember also that now recyclables no longer need to be separated.

Residents will now have access to hazardous waste pick up, right at their doorsteps. Specific items are listed below. **Save the environment while you also save money on your monthly utility bill!** Trash rates will be reduced from \$19.82 per month to \$18.77 beginning on June 1, 2012.

RECYCLING

Q: Will there be a charge for more than one recycle bin? All households/customers are entitled to receive one additional bin at no charge (total of two). Any additional bins will be charged to your utility bill, the amount consistent with Waste Pro's cost for the bin. Call Waste Pro at 586-0800.

Q: Can I use the bins I have now? Yes. However, in order to be counted in the recycling rewards program, you must utilize the new bin that contains the computer bar code.

DOORSTEP HAZARDOUS WASTE

Q: Who do I call for doorstep household hazardous waste pick-up? Please call Waste Pro directly at 586-0800 to schedule a pick up. Doorstep hazardous waste pick-ups will occur once per month on Saturday.

Q: What are the accepted hazardous waste items you collect? Motor oil and used motor oil, fluorescent light bulbs, antifreeze, paints, chemicals (pool & others), household cleaners, pesticides, herbicides and household batteries.

- TYPES OF HAZARDOUS CHEMICALS ELIGIBLE FOR PICK-UP WILL BE STRICTLY MONITORED AND LIMITED.
- AMOUNTS OF CHEMICALS WILL BE LIMITED AND MUST BE DISPOSED OF IN THEIR ORIGINAL CONTAINERS.
- > CHEMICALS MUST BE OF A RESIDENTIAL NATURE AND NOT OF COMMERCIAL ORIGIN.
- CHEMICALS THAT FALL OUTSIDE THE PROGRAM'S PARAMETERS MAY BE TAKEN TO THE COUNTY HAZARDOUS WASTE SITE ON OLD KINGS ROAD SOUTH OF S.R. 100. CALL THE LANDFILL AT 386 517-2075 FOR MORE INFORMATION.
- Q: Where can I leave my hazardous waste materials for pick-up? You may leave them either at the front door or at your garage door, no later than 7am on your designated pick-up day. DO NOT LEAVE ANY HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE MATERIALS AT THE CURB.

YARD WASTE CHANGES

You will no longer need to bundle standard yard waste. However, volume restrictions apply if your bundle exceeds 4 cubic yards and/or the nature of the yard waste pile requires the dispatch of a claw truck for removal. If a claw truck is required, additional costs will apply and will be payable directly to Waste Pro.

- Call 911 for all emergencies do not call the fire department directly.


About Temporary Modification of Disinfection Treatment Procedures:

In order to maintain the reliability of the water distribution system serving our customers, the City of Palm Coast Utility Department will temporarily change the disinfection process for the potable (drinking water) supply. From June 4 through July 3, 2012 we will disinfect the water with free chlorine rather than combined chlorine/ammonia (chloramines). This change will also affect residents and customers of Flagler County Utilities. This conversion to chlorine (which is a stronger disinfectant) from chloramines (which is a longer-lasting disinfectant) allows us to perform a water distribution system purge as recommended by the Department of Environmental Protection for water utilities using chloramines as their primary disinfectant. After this process is completed, we will revert to disinfection by the chloramines method.

During this period, customers may experience a slight increase in the taste and odor of chlorine. Customers on dialysis who use a proportioning machine to prepare dialysate are advised to contact their physician to obtain the appropriate steps to accommodate the change in water disinfection. Customers who have fish tanks or aquatic species are advised to contact a professional aquarist to avoid any problems associated with chlorine. About Concealing Your Air Conditioner from View:
