> for the character of our City. We've always been united in a focused quest for safeguarding our natural resources, setting us apart as unwavering leaders of community conservation. And we've accumulated many prestigious

regional awards recognizing our efforts. Aside from these awards, we're protecting resources by upgrading our

utilities. We've modified the process at two water treatment plants to more adequately provide safe drinking water utilizing improved conservation methods. We've added a Zero Liquid Discharge water treatment process to recover

previously wasted water. Our conservation and awareness programs presented to the community include newsletters, exhibits and social media or visit **www.palmcoastgov.com**.

To accommodate our further growth and ever-expanding need for preservation, we are breaking ground this year for construction of a second wastewater plant – this one located west of US1 near Matanzas Woods Parkway. It is anticipated that our existing wastewater plant on Utility Drive will exceed capacity by 2018 so a second plant will come online in late 2017 to meet projected future growth. The new state-ofthe-art facility will ensure that your wastewater from showers, sinks, washing machines, dishwashers and toilets is pumped and collected for advanced treatment and disinfecting at the highest quality level for conservation and reclamation for irrigation of public and private properties.

What can you do to conserve more water? Save the flush. Shower instead of bathe. Check your hoses and indoor/outdoor faucets for leaks. Don't keep the water running when you brush your teeth or wash dishes. You have the entire month of April to go online to www.mywaterpledge.com to make your pledge, but please don't put it off. Why not log on while you're reading this? Together, we can win this competition and even be eligible for a few great prizes. Better yet, we can solidify Palm Coast's legacy as a winner in the race to save our common resources. It's the smallest things we do that make the biggest difference.



As we approach our 2016 wildfire season, remember that climate conditions for El Nino could possibly affect the frequency and intensity of fires. Unpredictable forecasts may warn about sporadic drier or wetter and stormier weather, depending on the changing effects of El Nino. Here's what you need to know to keep your family and property safe: 1 – Pay attention to the Keech Byram Drought Index (KBDI) broadcast information in our area. A number one stands for very wet conditions, going up to a number 800 indicating extremely dry conditions. The higher the number, the better the chances for wildfires.

2 – Call 911 as soon as you see any smoke or flames from anywhere at any time.

3 – Be prepared to leave your home in a moment's **notice**. Take an emergency kit with you including ID papers, photographs/receipts for your valuables, medications, insurance policies and a road escape route from your home (smoke may disorient your driving).

4 – Be cautious when using charcoal for grilling. Soak used charcoal and dispose of it properly – don't just dump it anywhere.

5 – Trim trees and shrubs around your home and clear your gutters.

OUR POOL is always YOUR POO

Here's one of our most important pledges to our guests at Frieda Zamba: Your family is our family and our pool is yours. Our swimming pool staff is honored each season to warmly welcome you and make sure your experience brings you back to the pool. Attendants and lifeguards often greet people by name, recognize extended family members and most importantly, they are vigilant for your safety at all times.

Pool safety comes first at Frieda Zamba, with lifeguard in-service training consistently exceeding standards set by the American Red Cross. Twelve certified lifeguards attend 24 sessions each six-month season. They re-enact emergencies, practicing rescue techniques, applying CPR, first aid and automated external defibrillator skills. Guards are also subject to Red Alert surprise drills with simulated crisis scenarios that

require them to save drowning victims right on-the-spot.

"We continue to take the lead in safety preparation for other programs across our area," James Hirst states. As Palm Coast's Recreation Supervisor, he and his staff take pride in the quality and quantity of their drills, always seeking to upgrade their competence.

"If you want to feel secure and comfortable at a pool, spend some time at Frieda Zamba."

POOL SAFETY FOR KIDS - DO YOU KNOW?

- Holding your breath for underwater games is dangerous because swimmers can black out while trying to compete. Staff can recommend safer fun in the pool. - Using water wings to keep children afloat is not as safe as you think. Plastic can easily tear and acquire holes. When you purchase flotation devices, make sure they are stamped with a US Coast Guard seal of approval.

- Wearing street clothes in a pool can contaminate the water for other swimmers. Dressing in proper swim attire is mandatory.

Having a Yard Waste Conversation: Imagine if hundreds of homes on an average yard waste pick-up route set out huge piles of landscaping trimmings and haulers spent twenty minutes at each house. No one

would ever have punctual service. Its spring cleaning time, so we're asking neighbors to make sensible decisions with their yard waste so that everyone has timely collections. Please put out only enough that would have normally accumulated for one week, such as a bag

each of grass and hedge clip-



pings or weeds. If your trimmings extend all the way across a 2-car driveway and stand about 2-ft. feet tall, 3-ft. wide (4 cubic yards), your load is probably too large and would require an extra mechanical truck at an additional charge from Waste Pro. To avoid future questions about who is ultimately responsible for payment, have a talk in advance with a hired contractor to make sure your estimate includes yard waste removal.
