A Hurricane Watch is posted for Palm Coast:

How should you be preparing?

Fill your emergency kit. Make copies of your important documents and seal the rest in waterproof bags.

Find out which evacuation zone you live in. Zones are posted at various intersections east if 195 so you'll know if your neighborhood is announced that you are under a voluntary or mandatory evacuation.

If you've lost electricity and you have a PEP system: Your system operates at a control panel located on the outside wall of your home. If your panel light is green, your system is energized and working properly. If you've lost electricity, there is no way the system can effectively pump waste.

If this happens --

- 1. Place your household in 'conserve' mode by limiting your water use immediately: showers, toilets, dishes, laundry, etc. If possible, stay at a friend's or relative's house. Don't put cigarettes, grease or coffee grounds into the system.
- 2. In normal circumstances, PEP systems can go for about three days with no electricity, if you conserve water. You can call customer service at 386-986-2360.

About Temporary Modification of Water Disinfection Treatment Procedures:

In o<mark>rder to maintain reliabili</mark>ty of our water distribution system, the City of Palm Coast Utility Department will temporarily change the disinfection process for our potable (drinking water) supply. From Sept. 19 to Oct. 9, we will disinfect the water with free chlorine rather

than combined chlorine/ammonia (chloramines). This helps to ensure the quality of the drinking water in the distribution system. During this period, customers may experience a slight increase in the taste and odor of chlorine. Customers on dialysis who use a proportioning machine to prepare dialysate are advised to contact their physician to obtain the appropriate steps to accommodate the change in water disinfection. Customers who have fish tanks or aquatic species are advised to contact a professional aquarist to avoid any problems associated with chlorine. 
About Your New Wastewater Treatment Plant:

- Family Corn Hole & Kickball



Message From The Mayor Milissa Holland

Your City Council takes its responsibility for setting taxes very seriously. We recognize the amount of money you pay for your government services is an important part of your family budget. We carefully work to set a budget each year, one that establishes the most efficient and essential costs each taxpayer will need to pay for those City services.

In August, you'll be receiving your annual Notice of Proposed Property Taxes for 2018. This is a preliminary notice that shows your local governments are making plans. Your City Council very thoroughly goes through a budget-making process that involves utilizing the results from a citizen survey, implementing a strategic planning process, public workshops and hearings. All expenditures have a meaningful purpose and value to our residents. We focus on how much money it takes to keep the City running to the standards our residents expect, all the while understanding we are spending tax payer money. The budget relies on conservative projections and reflects the City's commitment to spend every dollar wisely.

It can sometimes be confusing to sort out which of your government entities deliver which services. Please know that each government body can only modify the services they each provide.

Council is limited only to Palm Coast's sphere of authority. What should you know?



PROPERTY TAX BILL Only 22% of your entire annual tax bill goes directly to the City of Palm Coast.

Other taxing authorities on your bill include Flagler County, Flagler County School District, St. Johns River Water Management District, East Flagler Mosquito Control District and the Florida Inland Navigation District. Your City property taxes pay for: Fire & law enforcement

protection; Streets & Parks Maintenance; Capital Projects



UTILITY BILL Monthly services include water and sewer to and from your home; garbage, yard waste and household hazardous waste pickup; recycling; stormwater drainage maintenance. Your monthly fees pay for: Garbage and recycling services, maintaining 500+ miles of water/wastewater pipes; 70 miles of freshwater and saltwater canals; 150+ miles of interconnected ditches; 1,200+ miles of roadside swales; 500+ miles of water/wastewater pipes



SHOP LOCAL SPENDING Spending your money locally for gas, groceries, clothing, gifts and dining out returns tax dollars directly back to our community. Your local spending helped pay for: Community Center & Holland Park complete makeovers; multi-use pathways
