

What began one year ago as a formidable, elaborate road project is now about 65% complete. The first phase of widening eastbound Palm Coast Parkway to six lanes is finally in our rearview mirror and residents can now focus on the road ahead. Phase Two, the westbound lanes, is presently in progress, to be finished in early summer. Phase Three will extend until December, 2015 when all six-lanes will be open, renovation complete and the construction equipment and orange cones will vanish!

Here's a summary of the final improvements:

- Three lanes of traffic will be constructed and paved both east and westbound, along the 1.23 miles of roadway between Cypress Point Pkwy/Boulder Rock Dr. and Florida Park Dr.
- Bike and pedestrian paths, curbs, gutters and sidewalks will be added along the entire project.
- Irrigation, stormwater retention, signals and signage will be upgraded.

Landscaping will add 458 new trees and shrubs. Many existing tree have already been transplanted to other Palm Coast locations.

To help reassure you that movement on Palm Coast

Parkway will not drive you too crazy, vehicle traffic will continue on two lanes running both east and westbound for as long as possi-

ble during the remainder of reconstruction. While it may seem that the new lanes are ready to open, crews are still working on elements of the project that are not always obvious to the naked eye. To ensure evenness of the finished roadway, all



six lanes and median cuts will be paved at the same time. Residents and visitors who enter Palm Coast at I-95 and Palm Coast Parkway will soon experience our signature landscape identity, a reminder that our City truly takes pride in our quality of life.

Just a few months ago, staff assembled temporary Pickleball courts in Belle Terre Park to accommodate requests from players who wanted to play right here rather than travel outside the city. Immediately, a core group of Pickleballers continued to show up and the enthusiasm keeps growing every week.

Owen and Joey McKechnie are two of our really enthusiastic players. Dividing their time between Palm Coast and Canada, the healthy outdoor lifestyle in our City attracted them to stay here a bit longer. When Owen heard about our new Pickleball program, he went to the park to meet other players and he's now become a team member every Monday and Wednesday.

"If you want to meet some really great people, have a lot of fun and still break a sweat, this is your game," he says. He and several of his Pickleball buddies have become local ambassadors for the game, helping to teach new players who stop by at Belle Terre Park and making them feel comfortable with the regulars.

Pickleball is a simple game to learn, combining the elements of badminton, tennis and ping pong. To win, singles, doubles and mixed-doubles teams must be first to score eleven points.

Compared to tennis, the court is smaller and the net is shorter. The actual game gives players a reasonable workout without the brisk velocity of tennis' abrupt starts and stops or the less active volleys in badminton.

The game was developed in 1965 on Bainbridge Island in Washington where Joel and Joan Pritchard attempted to improvise new entertainment for their family. Pulling together components of their favorite games, they came up with Pickleball, named after a pickle boat tradition of choosing leftover oarsmen to staff a rowing vessel. In 1984, a USAPA (US Pickleball Association) was organized and by 1990, the game became so popular, it was played in all fifty states. Pickleball was recognized in 2014 as a world-class sport with 2,500 places to play, 8,000 courts and over 200,000 registered players in the United States alone.

"Palm Coast is doing a great thing by getting behind Pickleball and offering it at no cost to their residents, Owen adds. "They're demonstrating how much they value an active quality of life in the community. I'm really proud to be part of this City's Pickleball explosion."

"We put out fires, we rescue people in terrible accidents, we provide advance life support in medical emergencies and we fight wildfires. Protecting our Florida - in every aspect of their lives - has always been our primary focus."

Do You KNOW the TOP TWO CAUSES of

Florida wildfires can be devastating, considering the potential loss of lives, homes, wildlife and foliage. Spring is our most vulnerable season, so it's crucial to know that the chief causes of wildfires are lightning and burning debris. There's nothing you can do to prevent lightning, but there IS something you can do to prevent burning flames from spreading:

- Ensure that your property's trees and shrubs are trimmed and that pine needles are removed from your roof and gutters.
- Be cautious when you are grilling. Don't dump used charcoal anywhere at any time - soak used charcoal in a bucket of water and dispose of it properly.
- Observe the City's Wildfire Hazard Mitigation Ordinance: a Palm Coast homeowner has a responsibility to mow any vegetation to the ground that is

considered a wildfire hazard, for a distance of 30-feet from the wall of their home to an adjacent empty lot.

You also need to be prepared to immediately evacuate your home in case of an emergency. Keep copies of insurance policies, medical records, social security numbers, birth certificates and all irreplaceable documents in a separate folder, ready to grab in a moment's notice. Have a pre-determined plan for where you would go to stay. Contact out-of-state relatives to let them know you are safe. Keep a note card in your car with specific directions for driving out of your neighborhood (smoke can easily disorient drivers).
