3.) Mr. L. drove from his P section home to a local shop to purchase books for his grandchild in Pennsylvania. His purchase could rehab a canal bridge in Palm Coast.

When cash registers ring in our City, your family, our local business owners and employees all benefit. Funding our local projects keeps us from having to raise property taxes or cut other essential services. And the City can subsidize these projects without having to borrow a single penny.


About the Dog Park: Dogs love Holland Park! The City wants to be sure you have a good experience, so if you take your dog to the dog park, follow these safety tips: • Go only if your dog is healthy and up-do-date with vaccinations. Ask your vet if any additional vaccinations might be recommended since your dog enjoys the

- dog park.
- Pick up your dog's waste and bring a bowl for fresh water. Parasites can be spread through feces and shared water bowls.
- Remember, any freshwater bodies in Florida can cause illnesses. So if your dog plays in the water, be sure to wash down at the rinse station at the entrance. You can bring your own shampoo if you'd like!
- Remove your dog's leash as soon as you enter the dog park. Leash aggression is common when one dog is on a leash and the others aren't.
- Be sure to stick to the appropriate side of the dog park for large or small dogs. And understand that dog parks are meant for pets that are well-socialized.
- call your dog over for a break.

• Watch your dog at all times. At any sign of a problem, such as growling or aggressive behavior,
