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Growing Connections in Palm Coast

It took 156 plants, 4 crepe myrtle trees and 20 bags of mulch to connect our community.

And it all began with Philip Cangialosi, an Eagle Scout candidate from our local Troop 402, who envisioned the creation of a lovelier layout to embellish the front of the Palm Coast Historical Society in Holland Park. While working on a different scout project in Holland Park, Philip and his mom, Helene, noticed the unadorned entrance of the building. Wanting to make an environmental difference in Palm Coast, Philip approached Society Vice President Kathy Reichard-Ellavsky and offered to design and plant at the property, free of charge.

Kathy was thrilled with the idea and coordinated help from The Garden Club at Palm Coast and our City staff to support Philip with his plan. He completed the entire entrance design for exactly where to plant lavender, dwarf mondo grass. coreopsis, firecrackers, Mexican heather and crepe myrtle. With a scholarship and donations, he purchased the plants locally and Garden Club members helped deliver them and advised him on transplanting methods. Parks and Recreation staff installed an irrigation system and provided manual support that was needed.

Everything came together one morning in fall when Scout Troop 402 and Cub Scout Pack 402 were joined by Matanzas High School Key Club members to plant. "I was so excited to see everyone come together and to bring attention to the Palm Coast Historical Society," Philip says. "We're most likely to succeed when we collaborate together as a team."

Speaking of the Tennis Center, City Council is proposing consideration of a new Regional Racquet Center to be located on the grounds of the present location at 1290 Belle Terre Pkwy. The new Center would include several high-quality pickleball courts alongside the current 10 clay tennis courts. Plans could also include locker rooms, showers and expanded parking. The proposed Regional Racquet Center is one of several additional Community Centers that could be coming to Palm Coast, targeting the 2008 Parks & Recreation Master Plan goal of having a Community Center in each sector of the City.

Holiday Trash Pick-Up: Trash pickup schedules will be altered to accommodate the up-coming holidays. Waste Pro will collect trash one day later than normal during the entire holiday period. There's no pick-up on Fri. Dec. 25 and Fri. Jan 1, moving those collections to Saturdays.
