Temporary Modification of Water Disinfection Treatment Procedures:

In order to maintain reliability of our water distribution system, the City of Palm Coast Utility Department will temporarily change the disinfection process for our potable (drinking water) supply. From Nov. 10- Nov. 30, we will disinfect the water with free chlorine rather than combined chlorine/ammonia (chloramines). This change will also affect residents and customers of Marinelar parts of unincorporated Hammock Areas and Flagler County Utility customers wno reside in Painters Hill and Beverly Beach. This helps to ensure the quality of the drinking water in the distribution system. During this period, customers may experience a slight increase in the taste and odor of chlorine. Customers on dialysis who use a proportioning machine to prepare dialysate are advised to contact their physician to obtain the appropriate steps to accommodate the change in water disinfection. Customers who have fish tanks or aquatic species are advised to contact a professional aquarist to avoid any problems associated with chlorine. Irrigating Your Landscaping This Winter:

During Eastern Standard Time (Sun. Nov. 1, 2020 to Sun. Mar. 14, 2021), residents can irrigate according to the City's Water Conservation Policy:

- 1. Irrigation is limited to one per week: Odd-numbered addresses on Saturday and shall not occur between 10am & 4p = Even-numbered addresses irrigate on Sunday and shall not occur between 10am and 4pm. Non-residents (businesses) on Tuesday and shall not occur between 10am & 4pm.
- **2.** Irrigation is allowed between 4 pm and 10am for users of private irrigation wells, on your designated days.
- 3. Residents using city water may irrigate only between midnight and 10am, on your designated days.
- 4. Hand-held hoses equipped with automatic shut-off nozzles are allowed at any time.
- **5.** Micro irrigation (drip systems and bubblers) are allowed at any time.
- **6.** Reclaimed water usage is allowed at any time, but when reclaimed water is available, the use of private irrigation wells is not authorized.

These restrictions apply to water withdrawn from ground or surface water, from a private well or pump or from a public or private water utility. They do not apply to irrigation using reclaimed water or storm water. Additional information is available in the water restriction section at www.palmcoastgov.com.


